## HOUSE WEEK Historic Primrose Inn offers possibilities

CAPE MAY - The Primrose Inn at 1102 Lafayette St., offers choices for the next owner. The former Victorian farmhouse is operated as a bed and breakfast with six suites and is being offered as a turnkey

operation. But according to real estate associate Ryan Griffin of deSatnick Real Estate, one of the key features to

this property is the grounds.
"The lot size is larger than the average lot in Cape

May," Griffin said.

Griffin said the grounds offer all the amenities, including a pergola covered rear patio, and something not to be overlooked, off street parking for seven

"There is also a side patio and covered front porch, but the top of it all is the gardens," Griffin said. "The real clincher is the grounds - they are unique to Cape

May."
Griffin said the Primrose
Inn, currently being operated as a year-round B&B, maintains great potential for either a business or sin-

gle-family home buyer.

"The trend has been turning B&Bs back into single family homes," he said. "At \$1 million and up that be-

comes challenging."

The Primrose Inn, he said, is "aggressively priced" at \$775,000, meaning it is priced to sell. On top of that, the property was renovated within the last 10 to 12 years. Renovations

included the addition of a guest dining room on the back of the structure. 'It could be kept as it is if this remains a B&B, or it would be a great additional living area," Griffin said. "If someone goes the route of a single family home, there is ample living space on the first



floor.'

If it remains a B&B in the new owner's hands, the Primrose Inn has a good history of affordability that carries it throughout the year. He said as a B&B there is the opportunity to be flexible with rentals, saying not everyone wants to commit to a full week, although that is

always an option. He said there is always a need for B&Bs as long as there are people who

require a short stay.
"In the off season it's not about the beachfront, it's about being in walking distance for the average person. It's locat-ed about midway between the downtown and the marina district," Griffin said.

The Physick Estate, the site of numerous in and out-of-season events, is literally "out back.'

The three-story, 1855 structure was constructed with ample sleeping space, featuring six bedroom suites. The third floor suite, which Griffin said is the favorite, has its own sitting more and a private bal sitting room and a private balcony facing Washington Street, where guests can get a glimpse of horse-drawn carriages passing by. Inside, the full bath includes a Jacuzzi tub.

"Every suite has its own bathroom, and it's not as if they were carved out of a closet. They are nicely sized," Griffin

A number of the rooms fea-ture king-sized beds with enough space to move around without feeling cramped. Additionally, the grounds offer enough spaces where guests can relax and be alone or commune together, as they wish.

He said the first floor features Burke crown molding and higher than large baseboard trim - which were characteristic of the period. The first floor living room also features a gas fireplace. Griffin said the gas fireplace was used to heat the entire first floor when

there was a power outage due to a winter

Griffin said there are also owner's living quarters on the first floor including a full kitchen
