before moving to the bay. "My husband was a marine biologist. He retired from the county as the marine extension agent, but his first love was aquaculture and oyster research. We moved here so he could continue aquaculture research with oysters as well as crabs," Tweed said. She said there is a large,

freestanding garage which was always used for aquaculture and boats.

The Tweeds' two children attended Cape May Elementary School, and their daughter teaches chemistry at Mid-dle Township High School. Their son raises oysters and lives in Annapolis, Md.

Mr. Tweed passed away in 2007, and she has had the house to herself, which is one reason she wants to sell - to downsize to something more manageable, but she plans to stay in the area.

Besides the main house, the cottage is also a year round residence, which can be rented as such or as a seasonal rental. Tweed said she has rented to seasonal workers who lived there and worked in Cape May, and charged \$1,200 per month during the season. She described it as a one bedroom, one bath cottage of about 600 square feet.

"Most of the renters loved being so close to the bay. They would bring kayaks and fishing gear...they loved the water activities when they were not working," she said. Besides the view, Tweed

always enjoyed walking the beach at night when she had her dog.

Other than the natural features, she said her home has lots of storage room.

"It has almost too much

and a lot of garage space.

"It is total garage space under house, as well as the freestanding garage, which opens front and back. It good to be able to pull boats in because the weather can be harsh in winter," she said.

enough by breezes off the Delaware Bay. Tweed said the home has multi-zoned central air-conditioning, but she didn't use it much – she just opened her windows. She said there is a screened in porch off the dining room facing the bay, where it was pleasant to dine or simply relax and watch the activity on the bay.

On the second floor there is another open deck. Tweed retired from the "George." She said she sometimes sees them perching or feeding near her home.

"There is a post that one sits on, and I have seen as many as three at once. Every couple of weeks I see them feeding at low tide, catching fish and crabs in the little tidal pools. They have been known to get some good sized fish," she said.
