Cape May County GOP holds its first convention

CAPE MAY, N.J.

WILDWOOD - With the rap of a gavel, Michael Donohue convened the 2011 CapeGOP Convention at the Wildwoods Convention Center on March

Republican Organization. About 300 people, including 168 Republican committee members, gathered in the center, which resembled a national political convention, complete with placards depicting the names of the 16 municipalities where committee members sat.

Assembly, a state redistricting process delayed the vote.

At the front of the room were four voting machines where Republican committee people cast their votes for candidates. This is the first time local Republicans could cast votes in private. Before, the process was done openly as the party leaders - who often chose the same candidates - looked on. Many Republicans felt this process intimidating and wanted a

more democratic process.
"It was said that this convention could not happen. Take a look around you. It's happening. Don't believe them when they say we can't take back the Senate and Assembly seats," Donohue said. "It's already happening here tonight."

Donohue said Republicans have the best shot of winning the November election and wresting control of the two First Legislative District seats, which are held by Democratic Sen. Jeff Van Drew and Assemblymen Nelson Albano and Matt

Milam. "I want you to imagine all of us gathered in November of election night. Imagine all of the returns coming in and imagine our candidates winning back the state Senate and Assembly seats," Donohue told the crowd. "It

can be so. The only thing that stands between us and victory in November is us.

"If we do the hard work and commit ourselves to supporting these candidates, we cannot fail."

The committee cast votes for two candidates for the freeholder board who will run in the November general election.

Amusement park owner Will Morey and Upper Township Committeewoman Kristine Gabor won nominations for Cape May County Freeholder.

Morey received 122 votes



The Great '62 Storm presented by Cape May Historical Society

CAPE MAY - In March 1962, forces of nature combined to create a perfect storm. The wind was out of the northeast, it was a new moon and the sun and moon were in perigee, meaning they exerted their pull on the tides together - all resulting in extremely high tides over the course of several days. Almost every town along the Jersey coast was under water twice a day when the ocean and bay met at high tide. The resulting devastation was astounding.

Harry Bellangy, President of the Greater Cape May Historical Society, lived in Cape May at the time and will share his recollections and pictures from his collection as well as other personal collections. There will also be photos and videos of other memorable Cape May storms. The video presentation will be held Saturday, March 19 at 1:30 p.m. at the Cape Island Baptist Church Hall. Free parking is available in the Church parking lot. The hall is handicapped accessible from the parking lot. Admission is free to GCMHS members, \$5 for non-members.

Latest bids for new Convention Hall construction project are rejected

CAPE MAY – City council members returned to the City Hall meeting room after a closed session meeting yesterday, and publicly announced that all the current bids for the City Convention Hall project have been rejected.

Council unanimously approved a resolution to reject the bids, which took effect immediately. Of the six bids received on March 8, only one was below the cost estimate and appropriation of funds for the project. That Harvey Benjamin Company, Inc.,

\$6,984,000. The next lowest bid was \$8,899,000.

According to City Manager Bruce MacLeod, the remaining five bids would have exceeded the \$10.5 million bond ordinance set forth for the project. The reason for the Harvey Company withdrawing their bid was due to a mistake in its calculation of the bid amount.

The resolution to reject the bids states, "It has been determined that the error was just to an unintentional mistake made in good faith, and that the City is not prejudiced other than by its loss of the bargain, thus constituting grounds for allowing a withdrawal of the bid by Harvey."

MacLeod said the city would re-advertise for the receipt of bids and restart the bidding process for the project by the end of the month. He said the city would begin receiving bids between April 15 and 30.

Mayor Edward Mahaney said that council was in total agreement that the new Convention Hall be operational by Memorial Day of 2012. He said the city can still re-bid the project and be finished with construction in a timely manner.

"This is a minor setback," Mahaney said. "We are all very disappointed in it."
