City defines engineer's duties

CAPE MAY — In May, ity Council approved Paul Dietrich for a newly created position, city engineer, and on July 3 passed an ordinance de-

scribing his duties. Dietrich was hired for a three-year term. His duties include supervising the performance of city projects, oversight of the city's Community Ratings System relating to flood insurance premiums, acting as flood plain administrator and municipal housing liaison.

He will assume many of the duties of former deputy city manager Lou Belasco who left the city's employment for another

would prepare or cause to be prepared designs, plans and specifications for public works and improvements undertaken by the city, provide and maintain surveys, maps, specifications and control records in respect to public works and facilities owned by the city, and provide technical and engineering assistance to

Townbank Road; the road is absolutely horrible,' Perry said. "You've got the volunteers running in there to go to fire calls, you've got the apparatus coming out."

He said he had emails from the county engineer indicating the paving would be undertaken in 2021 and 2022. Perry called the paving schedule for Townbank "totally unaccept-Road

Laffey said the state Department of Transportation (DOT) would be installing traffic-calming measures on Schellenger's Landing. He said the township has applied to DOT for a permit for improvements from the Route 109 bridge to the small bridge entering Cape May.

Traffic-calming measures proposed in the township's design include rectangular rapidly flashing beacon "yield to pe-destrian" signs at Schellenger's Landing Road, the road leading to the Lobster House and at Second Av-

"We're also putting center street crosswalk signs in those locations at the crosswalks to try and slow people down as well," Laffey said.

He said the township has an approximate \$25,000 cost share for the project with DOT. Laffey said he anticipated the project would begin in the fall and

limit sign would be placed at the foot of the bridge southbound.

"Hopefully, people will see their speed and slow down before they get to the Lobster House crossing where Lucky Bones is," Laffey said.

The Lower Township Public Works Department is planning to move to the Cape May County Airport. Laffey said Fare Free Transportation and the county road department are constructing a building at the airport expected to be completed in January.

"We're working out an agreement to get space in there for our Public Works Department to move our maintenance staff down there," he said. "We do handle work for the county right now; we fix all their heavy equipment there and sometimes we get overflow on their vehicles that Avalon can't handle because they have a contract with Avalon to do their vehicles

> He said Lower Township has a memorandum of understanding with the county to use a portion of the new building but not the final contract.

During summer months, township receives complaints from residents regarding commercial establishments that provide valet parking and claims those establishments are utilizing public spaces to park vehicles.

Council approved an ordinance that states valet parking must be confined to private property, a parking lot or garage. Valet parking attendants are prohibited from parking vehicles in on-street spaces, within the public right of way or in any municipally/publicly owned location.

Those failing to comply with the regulations may be fined as much as \$100 for the first offense and \$200 for second and/or subsequent violation.

Council approved an ordinance revising township code regulating towing and storage fees for vehicles. Indoor storage will cost \$30 per day and outdoor storage \$25 per day.

Towing companies are prohibited from charging storage fees in situations in which vehicles are stored within a municipally
