# Lower hires engineering firm for police station

VILLAS — In a 3-2 vote Monday, Lower Township Council approved a professional services contract for engineering services for a new police building.

The vote split along party lines, with council's three independents, Mayor Michael Beck, Deputy Mayor Norris Clark and Councilman Jim Neville voting to approve the con-tract. Republicans Erik Simonsen and Tom Conrad voted against the

#### contract.

The contract with Engineering Design Associates, of Ocean View,

is not to exceed \$28,650. The scope of the work includes a topographic survey, site plan with drainage, lighting, landscaping, grading and engineering details. The work includes construction plans, technical specifications and bidding documents.

Conrad said that from the beginning, he has been asking what the township was getting and how much it would cost. He said the township

would be spending a lot of money but council to vote in the positive. All that his two questions have not been answered.

Simonsen said the county was completing a study of the structural integrity of the current public safety building at the airport for possible use as a central 911 dispatch center and emergency management office. He questioned moving forward and spending taxpayer money before council approved the bonding of the project

Bonding of the new police building would require four members of recent votes concerning the project garnered 3-2 votes.

"In order to obtain a more accurate price, we're going to have to do this kind of work and hire the architect, the engineer to do the design," Beck said.

He said council has been debating replacing the public safety building for 10 years.

Beck said Conrad and Simonsen hoped the "county would ride to their rescue" and get them out from underneath the project. He said

bringing the police station to Villas was a safety issue.

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Beck said wards one and two were experiencing a drug epidemic. He said he liked the idea of having the new police station in close proximity to the library, senior center, Douglass Memorial School and the township's Recreation Center.

"It will have an impact on the safety of the residents," he said. Conrad said the cost of a new po-

An early-morning accident sent a car through the east and north walls of the small meeting room of the Millman Center. The roof of the car was cut away by fire personnel to free the driver from the vehicle.

Township Manager Mike Voll said he hoped the small meeting room would reopen in the fall.

The main hall of the center continues to be in use, he said.
