Laundry room fire sparks motel evacuation

CAPE MAY - A late night fire in the laundry room at the Beach Shack motel prompted the precautionary

evacuation of all 65 rooms. According to Cape May Fire Chief Jerry Inderwies Jr., a guest at the Beach Shack called 911 at 1:19 a.m., July 24, saying he or she could hear a smoke alarm going off and smelled smoke. Inderwies said there was no alarm system because of the date the building was constructed.

Police arrived on the scene first and met individuals near the rear of the hotel who led them to the laundry

annex, which provides laundry service for all Cape Resorts Group properties. Before firefighters were able to gain access to the laundry, smoke could be seen belching from a second floor vent and flames were visible through ground floor windows.

Inderwies said the fire started in a dryer where towels ignited and the fire spread through the room and to an adjoining room before being noticed.

"There was fire, smoke and heat damage throughout the annex," Inderwies said.

Before firefighters arrived police began pounding on doors alerting people to the fire and telling them to evacuate the motel. People made their way across Beach Avenue to the Promenade where they watched as firefighters arrived and staged their equipment to put out the blaze. Police officers were seen helping elderly guests cross the street.

Once firefighters were able to gain access to the laundry annex the fire was quickly brought under control, but the scene was not cleared until about 3:30 a.m.

Inderwies said there was the smell of smoke in some guest rooms but no fire or smoke damage. He said guests were allowed to return to the wing nearest the Rusty Nail restaurant and bar first. The Rusty Nail was opened

to allow others to wait until it was safe to return to their rooms. Inderwies said the occupants of 13 rooms were relocated to other Cape Resorts properties in Cape May. He said the 13 rooms were able to be reoccupied the

Asked why the unaffected building was evacuated, Inderwies said it was a matter of safety and the peace of mind of the guests. He said if people had not been alerted to the nearby fire they may have wondered why not. Additionally, electrical power and gas service had to be shut off.

"We isolated the power to affected

WEST CAPE MAY - Police arrested a borough resident and charged him with burglarizing Italiano's Restaurant, where he had been employed as a delivery

person. The break-in was discovered around 10:30 a.m., July 23, when a side entrance door had been found damaged in an apparent forced entry. The cash register and safe were broken open and a total of about \$14,000 was stolen.

An investigation by the Cape May Police Department led to the arrest of Jared Fratella, 30, of West Cape

Fratella had been employed briefly by the Borough of West Cape May in public works, but left borough employment after less than a month on the job. He was employed by Italiano's but only worked about three-anda-half hours since he was hired in May.



They Will Surf Again gearing up for Wildwood Crest waves

CAPE MAY - "They Will Surf Again," a headline program for the Life Rolls on Foundation, is planning an adaptive surfing event for Sept. 27, in Wildwood Crest. According Chad

deSatnick, the northeast coordinator for Life Rolls On, 'They Will Surf Again" (TWSA) is a program that allows paralyzed surfers, with the aid of volunteers, to experience what it is like to surf again.

"It's an adaptive surfing program for paralyzed individuals," deSatnick said. "Depending on the number of people who sign up we could have eight to 20 spinal cord injury victims in the water."

DeSatnick himself narrowly escaped a spinal cord injury in 2001, when while surfing he was thrown headfirst into three or four inches of water. He cracked two cervical ver- said. "Most of the particitebrae and doctors thought he might not walk again, let alone surf. He did walk again and is now working with Life Rolls On to help other people with C-spine injuries.

DeSatnick said with volunteers in the water, participants in They Will Surf Again don wetsuits and lifejackets and get on a surfboard with the help of volunteers. Many of the participants are surfers who were injured and this might he their first surfing experience after their accident. DeSatnick was at a recent event in Long Branch, which attracted some 20 to 30 paralyzed surfers. DeSatnick said despite the name, the participants do not have to have been surfers prior to their paralysis.

"Three or four (at Long Branch) had surfed prior to the event, but the majority were not necessarily surfers prior to the event," deSatnick

pants have spinal cord injuries, but the event is not limited to that.'

DeSatnick said although spinal cord injury is the focus of Life Rolls On, the organization doesn't limit its efforts to spinal cord injuries or para-

"Ā person doesn't have to be paralyzed to participate in They Will Surf Again," he

DeSatnick said the event makes him realize how lucky he was to escape more serious injury.

Before I used to say that I feel really lucky, but when I got involved with TWSA I learned injuries could be far worse. I went to TWSA in June, and it reinforced the fact that my injury was very serious and the results could have been way different for me," he said.

DeSatnick said Life Rolls On purchased a beach wheel chair this spring and donated it to the city of Cape May. DeSatnick said They Will

Surf Again is a weekend-long event, and Life Rolls On founder Jessie Bilhauer will be in town on Friday, Sept. 25, and will be speaking at Lower Cape May Regional and Middle Township High

On Saturday, Sept. 26, Life Rolls On is holding its fourth annual east coast golf tournament at Cape May National Gold Course, Since 2006 the East Coast Golf Tournament has raised \$85,000.

Coast Guard crew from Cape May intercepts drug boat

MIAMI - The crew of the Coast Guard Cutter Vigorous intercepted the motor vessel Capt. Lem, 170 miles southwest of Jamaica on June 15

In accordance with international law, the Coast Guard requested permission from the Honduran government to board and search the vessel. Honduran authorities confirmed the vessel was Honduran flagged and authorized the crew of the Vigorous to search the vessel.

During the search, crewmembers from the Vigorous noted a suspicious tank onboard. Upon opening the tank, 77 packages were observed. Further tests revealed the packages contained a total of 3,300 pounds of cocaine.

The crew of the Vigorous transferred the alleged crewmembers and cocaine to FBI agents in Port Canaveral,
