Though Prosky is probably best known for his portrayal of the kindhearted desk sergeant Stanislaus "Stan" Jablonski on "Hill Street Blues," a part he played from 1984 to 1987, he also had several other recurring roles. An example of such roles was a priest accused of murder on the ABC legal drama, "The Practice." Prosky also played Kirstie Allie's father on two different sitcoms, "Cheers" as well as "Veronica's Closet." Prosky performed in many guest appearances and television films over his career. His final television appearance was in the 2006-2007 season of "ER," in which he played a victim of Alzheimer's disease who had just lost his son in an accident. Incidentally, the part of his son was played by

Prosky's own son, Andrew. Bob Prosky was a strong supporter of the local artistic scene. Since he owned a house in Cape May Point, Prosky could also be seen at functions fundraisers in the area, lending his name to bring awareness to local artistic organizations. His final attendance at a local event was last month during the Cape May Film Festival, an organization to

whom he had given his lecture "An with Evening Prosky" Robert several times over the years.

Ed Henry, president of the Cape May Film Festival, said, "Cape May has been blessed to have the presence of Robert Prosky in this community. He was an outstanding actor, true professional, and a great friend. Bob was an integral part of our Film Festival, from being the first featured speaker we've ever had and we've hosted several other notable Hollywood favorites - through various benefits during the years, right up until this past festival last month where we had an inaugural special recognition award in his name for one of the film selections he particularly enjoyed. 

Previous to his appearance in "The Price," Robert Prosky appeared in Cape May Stage's one-night benefit productions of A.R. Gurney's "Love Letters" once in the early 90s with Grace Gonglewski and also in the spring of 2000 with Oscar award-winning actress, Estelle Parsons.


Prosky later appeared in a short documentary about Cape May Stage's capital campaign Project Encore and played a role in launching the start of the theatre's 4-year restoration project. Prosky also served as a member of the theatre's Artistic advisory board and often frequented the Stage in the summertime with his

Andy and John in 2006." Felicetti continued. "In my personal conversations with Bob I always found him to be down-to-earth, thoughtful, gracious and helpful."






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
