Mahaney said Monzo was first appointed city solicitor in 1999 by a 3-2 vote. He said he voted against Monzo's appointment for two reasons, the first being there was no open and transparent selection process.

"He was hand picked by certain mem-bers of council," Mahaney said.

The second reason, Mahaney said, was because Monzo was already the solicitor in Lower Township and he believed at the time, as he does now, there was an opportunity for a conflict of interest in certain cases, specifically with regard to police and fire services and the water and sewer issues.

He said if Monzo was going to consider or accept the position in Lower Township he should have notified city council.

"It was only professional etiquette and it was not done," Mahaney said. Mahaney said he was not looking to

cause contention but felt the matter needed to be commented upon publicly

as a matter of honesty.
"I don't believe there is a conflict with serving in two adjacent towns," Monzo said. "There is always a potential in any legal capacity where legal conflicts arise, but in the seven and a half years I represented both municipalities, Cape May and Lower Township, there was never an instance when I had to stop representing either town.

Monzo said there were, however, conflicts with private clients and a munici-

As far as the not informing Cape May City Council of his intention to take the Lower job, Monzo said it all happened at the end of the year around the holidays, and since he had served as solicitor in both municipalities up until two years ago he didn't give notifying Cape May a

"If serving in the position was brand new, I would probably have been more sensitive to notifying them," Monzo said. Monzo said he could not comment on

the active legal cases the mayor referred to, but said he did disagree with the mayor's opinion.

"I respect the mayor and his opinion, and he is entitled to it. I don't have any animosity toward him. We have had a good working relationship and it will continue despite this particular issue.

Mahaney said he would favor designating spaces by parking meter numbers so there would be no question about whether the spot was north or south of an intersection, for example. Mahaney said he was also interested in reviewing the entire ordinance, not just the section pertaining to locations, so they would not have to address other issues in the future

ing at 28 weeks. He said he has investigated the matter for two years, and some markets, such as Cowtown, close at the end of the season. U-Sell, he said, operates year around. Ginsberg said he envisions opening three days a week initially and maybe expanding to five days. He said the pavilion would be able to be taken down at the end of the operating period.

Ginsberg said there would probably be a need for parttime employees with the possibility of creating full-time jobs in the future.

Township Manager Kathy McPherson said flea markets are now a permitted use only for non-profits, but suggested having the planning board review the request and make recommendations. She said the ordinance could be amended to include other than non-profit organizations.
