Middle Township soccer star charged with DWI after fatal crash

HAMILTON TOWNSHIP - A Cape May County man who plays profes-sional soccer in two leagues was charged with driving while intoxicated after a crash that left one person dead.

State Police allege that Matthew Maher, 24, of Cape May Court House was driving his Cadillac Escalade at a high rate of speed March 7, at around 2:51 a.m., when he struck a mini-van from behind.

According to State Police spokesman Sgt. Gerald Lewis, Police troopers were called to mile marker 18.6 on the eastbound side of the Atlantic City Expressway in Hamilton Township. Lewis said the driver of a 2007 Escalade allegedly struck the second vehicle from behind, forcing the vehicle over a guardrail and causing it to roll over and stop on the driver's side. Meanwhile, the Escalade moved over to the left shoulder with severe front end damage.

Lewis said the driver of the mini-

van was partially ejected and determined to be deceased at scene. The dead man had no identification and police were trying to identify him through fingerprints. The deceased was taken to Shore Memorial Hospital in Somers Point for autop-

Maher was charged with driving while intoxicated after a field sobriety test and a blood sample was taken. Lewis said the investigation is ongoing and other charges may be filed pending the completion of the investigation by the Atlantic County

Prosecutor's Office.

Maher attended Cape Christian
Academy and Middle Township High School, where he was the school scoring leader, played for the Cape Express Youth Soccer Club, and was a captain on the Temple University soccer team in 2005-06. He also played in the Premier Development League (PDL) with the Ocean City Barons.

According to his website, he was entering his second season as a professional soccer player with the Carolina Railhawks of the USL and

indoor soccer with the New Jersey Ironmen of the MISL. Maher and his brother Anthony run the Maher Brothers Pro Touch Soccer Camp in the area.

Maher is also listed as a spokesperson for Athletes In Action, a Christian sports ministry, and has residences in Cary, N.C. and Newark. He is the son of former Lower Township Police Chief and May Cape current Undersheriff John Maher.

The merger of the two Red Cross chapters also didn't take place overnight or just for the sake of consolidation, Rutala said.

The Cape May chapter approached Atlantic/Cumberland chapter approximately six months ago. He indicated that the

chapter was experiencing some financial hardships. He did not elaborate what they were, but Southern Shore Chapter Executive Director Pamela Grites said, "We have to raise every dollar to be viable.

Red Crosses do not receive financial assistance from the government or from the national American Red Cross

organization. Grites further noted she is unaware of the actual dollar

amount the Cape May chap-ter's operating budget was prior to the merger, but speculated that it was in the vicinity of \$150,000 to \$170,000.

There are, however, several fundraisers in the works, including an upcoming golf outing at Wildwood Country Club on April 22.

The money raised goes toward the services and aid provided to local families in times of crisis.

Frazier was transferred to Cape May County Regional Medical Center for treatment of a minor self-inflicted knife wound to the chest which occurred before police arrived on scene. He was then lodged in the Cape May County Jail on \$75,000 cash bail.
