## Resolution pertained only to Cape May's multiple advisory committees

environment, where people exist today and spend so much time communicating, and organized it around a mission for public safety in partnership with law enforcement," said Matt Bloom, founder and CEO of Crimewatch. He said Crimewatch

uses big data and analytics to measure how a police department is doing with engaging with the public. The web, social media and mobile apps are used by Crimewatch to get information to the community, according to Bloom.

"When a police officer has an important incident they want to push out to the community, they enter it into the Crimewatch system and it will automatically distribute to the Crimewatch apps, to local media contacts, to the website, to the mobile app and any TVs that live in that network, out to any attached social media and also for notifications to residents, stakeholders and people in the community," he said. Bloom said by sharing

information on a continuing basis, Crimewatch can reach 40 percent of the local population at any given time. Cape May police will

> Bloom encouraged residents to download the Crimewatch mobile app to their phones and set Cape May Police Department as their choice.

> "Moving forward, any time the police department puts out an alert or if there is an emergency broadcast, you can get a push notification on your phone," he said. Included in Crimewatch

are email notifications and daily and weekly digests of police activities in emails. Mapping will show where crimes are taking place. An anonymous tip submission platform will allow the public to share information with police, Bloom said.

A security camera registry system will allow local businesses and residents to share captured video to aid police. Bloom said the police department would not have unauthorized access to security cameras.

Residents will be able to register through Crimewatch for home checks by police when they are away on vacation. Also included are a traffic complaint system and an officer commendation system, accord-

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## Lower Twp. awards \$2.4M. contract for Roseann Ave. work

VILLAS — In a special meeting Monday, Lower Township Council approved a \$2.4 million contract with Mount Construction Co. for Phase III of the Roseann Avenue roadway and utility improvements project. The last phase will extend the project to Bayshore Road.

Four contractors submitted bids. Other bids were South State Inc. at \$2.6 million, Agate Construction at \$2.9 million and Mathis Construction at \$3.7 million.

According to a letter from the township's contracted engineer, Mark Sray of Mott MacDonald, the winning bid from Mount Construction was 13 percent below the enproject.

Township Council

passed an ordinance in May amending and supplementing a bond ordinance from 2015 for drainage and storm water improvements to Roseann Avenue. The description was amended to increase the appropriation by \$4.1 million and to cancel bond ordinance 2018-18. The 2018 ordinance appropriated \$3.9 million for Phase 3 of the project.

Agate Construction was awarded a \$7.2 million contract for phases one and two of the project in 2018.

At a June 10 special council meeting, Councilman David Perry said Phase III was the last section of the project.
