Comments from previous meetings were incorporated into the concepts, he said. The concepts would be used to create a 3D computer model, Adomato said. The program can change the façade and features.

"We would like to look at for the next meeting, everything in the floor plan, so we'd start to draw all three concepts in floor plan," he said. "We'll start to see how the corridors function, how you enter into the fire department, how you enter into the police department, where the public comes in."

Adomato said he toured the Franklin Street School. He said if it the school becomes a library, a few parking spaces for the public safety building may be needed for a library dropoff area.

A geotechnical investigation is under way at the firehouse to determine subsoils and whether or not the building would need piling, he said. An environmental investigation was conducted for only asbestos but will be expanded to include lead paint, according to Adomato.

He said a proper turning radius has been designed for ambulances, which would exit the new building toward the side of the Franklin Street School.

Options two and three received the most favorable comment from the committee. Option 2 has a combined fire and police station that would demolish the fire museum and incorporate it into the new public safety building, according to Bender. Firetrucks would exit onto Franklin Street as they do today. The fire museum and police station would be on Washington Street, he said.

Between the entities would be a shared space and a fifth apparatus bay for the fire department. The training tower would be next to the museum, Bender said.

He said support areas, such a locker rooms and a kitchen, would be located on the second floor along with administrative offices. Option 1 shows 90 parking spaces where 64 spaces currently exist. Adomato said fewer spaces would exist on the final plan.

The basement would have shared mechanical space, shared archive space and a shared fitness area. Option 2A would have a smaller basement with a mechanical room on the second floor

Option 3 has the police and fire stations combined but would have more of an appearance of separate buildings, Bender said. The fire museum would be located between the police and fire sections, he said.

Police operations would be located on Washington Street with fire apparatus bays on Franklin Street. The training tower would be located on the rear of the building towards the Franklin Street School.

Bender said Option 3 does not include a drop-off area for a future library in the Franklin Street School. Ambulance bays would exit toward the school. The public safety building would have a shared lobby. The museum would be located

between the police and fire sections.

The second floor would contain administration offices for both departments and lockers, a bunk room and kitchen, according to Bender. The basement would house a mechanical room, archive storage and a fitness area, he said.

An elevator and stairs would access the basement.

Committee member Shaine Meier, a councilman, suggested the fire museum be moved to the front of the building toward Washington Street. Adomato said that would also create more parking. The lobby for the fire department would be located at the rear, facing a walkway from City Hall. The police department lobby would be located on Washington Street.

Bender described Option 3 as two separate buildings under one roof. Fire Chief Alex Coulter said he favored Option 2, while Police Chief Tony Marino said he preferred Option 3. Marino said moving the museum toward Washington Street could create two or three covered parking spaces. He said he preferred placing as many support options as possible on the second floor.

Committee member Rose Trafficante said the meeting resolved a lot of issues raised in earlier discussions.

Adomato said alternative energy for the building would be explored, in particular geothermal energy.

The committee's next meeting is scheduled for 10 a.m. May 28 in City Hall auditorium.
