owns a bar and restaurant in Cape May and he fully understands the difficulties businesses are experiencing. He said some members of the public asked how he could consider adding alcohol to a national pandemic.

Mullock said he also heard from business owners who were struggling. He said he was in favor of allowing more seating for restaurants and bars outdoors.

"I don't necessarily think that mobilizing alcohol is the best way to do this,' Mullock said.

He said he abstained from the vote because his family's bar and restaurant would be affected by the resolution.

Meier said if council did not help businesses, some of them would not be here next year.

Hendricks said one of the hardest-hit portions of Cape May's economy has been restaurants. She said it is unknown when operation of restaurants would return to normal.

"We must find as many ways as possible for these businesses to operate, hence the outdoor seating

The general manager of the Cape May Fish Market restaurant stated a number of layoffs have occurred in restaurants and bars in the city.

"By allowing the porta-bility of alcohol, it gives businesses a fighting chance to rehire staff, start ordering products and services, employ local vendors such as farmers, clammers, fishermen and many other small local businesses," she stated in an email.

Michael Slawek, owner of the Ugly Mug and Delaney's, stated a number of other towns had approved open container resolutions. He stated his businesses employed 250 persons, many of who were the sole wage earners in their household. Slawek stated without permitting open consumption, some business could close forever.

In an email, Jeff Gernitis, owner of Peter Shields Inn and FiNS, Bar & Grille stated he supported the resolution. He stated Cape May would not turn into a "wild west drunken frontier town" because of this four and half month temporary resolution.

"This resolution is about delivering a good guest experience to our visitors during very trying times," Gernitis stated. "The money to be made will be a pittance compared to what was made when restaurants were fully operational."
