WEST CAPE MAY — The West Cape May Business Association is asking Borough Commission to return the Strawberry Festival to Wilbraham Park after it was moved to Backyard Park. The borough's Shade Tree Commission voted to end such events in Wilbraham Park due to wear and tear to the park from festivals

At a March 9 Borough Commission meeting, Mayor Carol Sabo said her opinion was not to have Borough Commission overrule a decision of the Shade Tree Commission.

He said he understood events were removed from Wilbraham Park due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

'And then we were told the park is not being used by anybody anymore except for the garden club or whatever it's called, and we don't quite understand that," Causey said.

The West Cape May Business Association has done a lot for the community over the years and donated to the fire company and Christmas parade and to improvements to the park, he said.

The association's only fundraising event is the Strawberry Festival. When the festival is held in Wilbraham Park it raises a considerably higher amount of money than when the event

Causey said.

He said people walk to the Strawberry Festival from Cape May when it is held in Wilbraham Park, something they are less likely to do when it is staged in Backyard Park.

The capacity for which we can put in merchants is considerably higher," Causey said. "The whole atmosphere of it is much better.²

He said the business association has not received any complaints about the condition of Wilbraham Park after the Strawberry Festival. "We, in fact, hired em-

ployees of the borough to come and clean it up afterwards and it was always left in very good condition," Causey said. "What other groups did I have no idea."

The borough does not do a lot to benefit businesses, he said. Causey asked the bor-

ough to reconsider allowing the Strawberry Festival in Wilbraham Park.

Borough solicitor Frank Corrado said the Shade Tree Commission statute gives them jurisdiction over the management of public parks in West Cape May.

Doug Carnes, an owner of Wilbraham Mansion, read from John Wilbraham's will from 1922 which stated he gave to the borough a tract of land "for the purpose of a public park upon condition that it shall be named Wilbraham Park." The will also left \$20,000 for the construction of municipal buildings on a small portion of the tract.

"The point I'm trying to make is John Wilbraham wanted it to be an area where people were," Carnes said. "The business community is centered down there.'

The festival that supports the businesses should be in Wilbraham Park, he said. Carnes said the Shade Tree Commission did not

The Strawberry Festival was held in Wilbraham Park for 25 years, Carnes said. "What the commission

did was threaten our financial viability as a group, this
