# CanalFest music festival to benefit Cape Assist

COLD SPRING — Fifty years ago this August, Woodstock rocked a generation of young people with its message of peace and love. Ritchie Havens, a little-known musician then, opened the music festival, setting the tone for the times with words from the '60s hit "Get Together."

"Come on people now, smile at your brother, everybody get together, try to love one another right

for Cape Assist to combat substance abuse in the community.

The 2018 benefit drew nearly 500 people to the banks of Cape May Canal, where they enjoyed nonstop music, dancing, food and drink. This year's lineup includes 25 musicians, among them the Cape May Diamonds, whose popularity got the party started in 2013; Kate Delaney, Don Shough, Chris Gillin-Schwartz and Howard Street Ramble

The couple owns Rio Station restaurant in Rio Grande, and both are active in many local charities. Ric Rutherford has been president of Cape Assist's volunteer board since 2015. Giving back

Rutherford added Cape Assist to the party mix in 2017, the fifth year of the festival.

"I turned the party into a benefit because I thought the gathering should have a grander purpose than partying, wine and music," he said. "It's the same event but now we're helping oth-

Cape Assist has worked to prevent and treat substance abuse and related issues throughout the county for nearly four decades. It served 15,000 individuals last year, half of them children.

The 2018 CanalFest raised \$8,000 for the nonprofit.

"Money from the community is the most important funding we receive because it helps us address needs

Cape Assist Executive Director Katie Faldetta said.

Other funding sources are less flexible. State and federal grants, for example, take several years to process, by which time other more pressing needs may have emerged.

'Issues like the opioid epidemic can become a crisis long before govern-ment can address them," she said.

#### **Beginnings**

The prequel to CanalFest was a reunion in 2013 for the fans of Cape May Diamonds. The group formed in 1973 when a meeting of minds and music brought together Rutherford, Rick Ferrente and Patty Pellegrino. For the summers of '75, '76 and '77, the folkrock trio was the house band at Gloria's — Cabana's right in front of us as soon today — playing six nights as we see them," longtime a week from Memorial Day through Labor Day.

The group's founding members continued to play local clubs and bars well into the 1990s, with other musicians rotating in and out over time, and diehard fans faithfully following the principals from gig to gig.

Things slowed down in the new millennium.

'By 2005, a lot of clubs wanted us on from 10 to 2, said Rutherford, "but a lot of our fans didn't want to stay up that late. I called it the 'Take a Nap Tour.'

The Rutherfords set more boomer-friendly hours for their first canal party, starting festivities at 3 p.m. They also gave the event an adult name last year, CanalFest, to befit its larger role.

"CanalFest has grown into the event we all mark on our calendars a year out," said Howard Petschler, a former lifeguard who has followed the band since its "Gloria's"

days. "It's a great music event that brings the entire

Cape together."

"What started as a house party with lifelong friends and musicians has evolved into a heartwarming event that helps people in need in Cape May County," said Ed Dobbs, a musician who has played every year at the festival.

Join the party and support a good cause June 23 at 929 Seashore Road. Look for the driveway north of the canal on the east side of West Cape May Bridge. The event runs from 4 p.m. until just around midnight.

### 'Avalon House' back together in Cape May

CAPE MAY — Dismantled in Avalon and stored in Egg Harbor Township for a year, the "Avalon House" is now fully reassembled in Cape May.

Adrienne Scharnikow had the first portion of the home, once owned by her grandparents, moved by truck March 15 and placed that section on a lot on Texas Avenue across from the Wawa market.

On June 11, the remainder of the home, the roof and turret, arrived by truck.

As with the first portion of the house moving, it resembled a short parade as the truck with a police escort moved down Broadway and up Beach Avenue in Cape May.

It drew the attention of beachgoers and others who have followed the progress of the house.

The house had been one of Avalon's oldest homes, built in 1895.

It is registered as a founding house of Avalon built by George W. Kates. the first tax assessor and the first builder in Avalon.

Scharnikow bought the house, which was slated for demolition, a year ago for \$1 and searched for an empty lot in Cape May.

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
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
