The city's emergency management team met and is receiving prices for lightning arrestor systems.

"We're looking at potentially putting an arrestor up there that would cover essentially almost the entire block from here, from Ocean (Street), Lafayette to Franklin to Ocean," Di-etrich said. "We're also having an electrical engineer come in and evaluate and give us recommendations on surge protection, both whole-building surge protection on the electrical side but also surging on the communications side as well."


