

Cape May police offer program for those who are living alone

CAPE MAY — The Cape May Police Department offers the Reassurance Program to residents of Cape May, West Cape May and Cape May Point who are elderly, disabled, live alone or face other challenges that put them at increased risk in their homes. Participation in the program is completely voluntary and there is no cost to residents.

Members of the Reassurance Program call a designated telephone number at the Cape May Police Department on a daily basis, generally between 5 and 10 a.m., and give their name to the police dispatcher. If the resident has not called in by 10 a.m., a call is placed to his/ her residence. If no contact is made by telephone, a police officer is sent to the resident's home to ensure that they are ok. If the responding officer has reason to believe that the reassurance resident is home and for some reason unable to answer the telephone or unable to come to the door, the police officer will make entry into the home. Entry can be made either by a predetermined hidden location for the key to the residence or the use of a lock box, a piece of hardware mounted to the exterior of the home containing a spare key to the residence. The lock box is a heavy-duty unit that can be unlocked only by Cape May police and fire personnel.


