to allow common sense to prevail.'

Thompson said an animal could not be left in a garage with a temperature less than 32 degrees but could remain in a 32-degree garage with a concrete floor. Stefankiewicz said the ordinance had a temperature scale and the general provisions of Subsection G of the ordinance prohibit pet owners from withholding proper shelter, protection from weather, veterinary care and immunizations, as well as food and water.

The ordinance stipulates dogs shall not be confined for more than nine hours outdoors and shall be in a temperaturecontrolled environment when it is below 32 degrees or above 90 degrees.

The ordinance states dogs must be able to move freely when chained or tethered and shall not be confined for a period longer than nine hours. The size of the tether or chain must be a minimum of 15 feet and must remain tangle-free.

The ordinance amendment states a doghouse must be accessible to chained or tethered dogs and no dog shall be chained or tethered outside for more than 30 minutes after sunset or before sunrise.

In addition, owners or caretakers of pets must provide sufficient food and drinkable water on a daily basis. The ordinance specifies that no animal shall be subject to unnec-essary suffering and cruelty such as subjecting the animal to prolonged fear, injury, pain or physical abuse.

"Interaction with humans and other animals shall not be withheld," it states.

"If you have an unusual circumstance, it might be 32 degrees but an animal control officer or a police officer can still look at Subsection G and

make a determination that it's improper," Stefankiewicz said.

He said the ordinance has been discussed during six council meetings during which council grappled with how it could define each and every problem that may arise if a pet is inside or outside during the summer or inside during winter.

Stefankiewicz said council elected to stay with the language is Subsection G, which he called a "catch all" that prohibits certain activities in the body of the ordinance before Subsection G.

"You're not going to be able to legislate every single circumstance as it might arise, but if you take a look at the ordinance in total, it probably covers every circumstance and situation that could arise, he said.

Failure to comply with the ordinance is subject to a fine of \$100 to \$1,000.
