his decision to close or forbid the reopening of certain patios on the Washington Street Mall, for failure to implement a system for new permit requirements, and for "His failure to adhere to the directives of city council regarding improved public relations.

The applause from the public in response to the announcement of his removal perhaps illustrated the last point.

Corea came under fire in September 2006, when after a budgetary shortfall was identified for lifeguard services, Corea pulled the lifeguards

the day after Labor Day without consulting city council. After transferring funds from other accounts, lifeguard services were restored for weekends in September.

In October 2006, a committee consisting of council members David Kurkowski and Linda Steenrod, former police chief Robert Boyd, for-Cape May mayor Thomas Phelan, and Suzanne Smigo, was given about seven weeks to conduct a review of Corea's performance as city manager, and to make recommendations. The committee unanimously supported giving Corea a new, three-year

contract when his contract expired on Jan. 31, 2007, and council decided to award a new contract in a Dec. 21, 2007 closed session meeting. Less than half way into the new contract, council opted to remove Corea.

Monzo said the city manager is a contractual position, and an "at-will" position, meaning he or she works at the discretion of the city

"The city manager can be removed for cause, or no cause," Monzo said.

Monzo said Corea is not alleged to have done anything

Corea now may request a public hearing on his removal, which must be conducted not less than 20 days, nor more than 30 days after his removal. Monzo said Corea has time to request the hearing, and he would not speculate on what Corea would do.

Mayor Jerry Inderwies indicated at the end of Tuesday's meeting that Monzo would speak to the press on behalf of the city council, and no member of council would be speaking directly to the press. Inderwies declined any comment when contacted on Wednesday. Mayo Edward Mahaney Mayor-elect declined comment other than to say, "The city of Cape May will continue to move forward."

A phone message left with the city manager's secretary was not returned before publication.

Monzo said Corea sat in on the first part of a closed session held Tuesday before the public meeting. He said Corea answered questions about the handling of the patio permits over Memorial Day weekend and then was excused. Monzo then advised city council on their options,

and council made the determination to remove Corea, which was done by a public vote, with all members voting for his removal.

Monzo said he would recommend council take a final vote on Corea's removal whether or not Corea requests a public hearing.

City council passed a second resolution naming Cape May's chief financial officer, Bruce MacLeod, interim city manager. Monzo said by contact Corea would continue to be paid for 90 days. Monzo said Corea was currently earning \$115,000 per year as city manager.

As she looked around she realized she didn't know any of the students' names.

On the other hand, all three of the girls still felt connected to the other two, as demonstrated by a simple act of trust when they went on their tour of the school.

"It was almost like we never left each other. I hadn't really talked to Lindsay for about five years, and I hadn't seen Deven for about a year. But when we met (on Monday) we didn't feel awkward. To show that, I had a big purse and the other girls didn't. When we went to walk around the school they just threw their keys and stuff in my purse without even asking, and I felt that was a cool thing. It meant we still trusted each other," Weinberger said.

"I didn't even give it a second thought," Parker said, laughing, when reminded of the incident.
