

#### Salvatore receives Alice Stokes Paul award

Historic Cold Spring Village Executive Director Anne Salvatore was honored with the 2008 Alice Stokes Paul Award from the Cape May County Advisory Commission on the Status of Women. The acknowledgment was presented at an Award Dinner, held Nov. 19 at the Wildwood Golf Club. Salvatore has dedicated her life to volunteerism and historic preservation. As a co-founder of Historic Cold Spring Village and NASW Aviation Museum, her efforts have saved 25 historic buildings from destruction with six of those buildings being listed on the National Registers of Historic Places. The Cape May County Board of Chosen Freeholders created the Advisory Commission on the Status of Women on Dec. 11, 1984. Individuals chosen as members of the commission represent various segments of the Cape May County population. The commission encourages an environment that promotes the status of women and girls in the community.

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said the jetties are necessary to keep the inlet from moving around. Without the jetties, he said, the shoals would shift and could cause a barrier for the Coast Guard, which he said depends on stable egress to the ocean for rescue or security purposes.

Pakin said anytime there is an inlet with jetties they have an issue with erosion on the south side of the inlet. This project will fill in eroded areas and allow the sand to drift to Cape May beaches and south.

The Army Corps awarded a \$2.3 million contract to Environmental Controls of Ford City, Pa., for the eighth cycle of beach renourishment. Although it is part of a 50-year commitment during which beaches are reevaluated and renourished every two years, Pakin said the money must be appropriated with each cycle.

The sand will be trucked in from the Albrecht and Huen sand quarry in Middle Township, Trucks are expected to run between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m., Monday through Friday. The trucks will come into Cape May on Lafayette Street and turn left on Sidney Ave., left on Washington Street, right on Texas Avenue, veer right Pittsburgh Avenue, and left on Delaware Avenue going into the training center.

Pakin said while they project the trucks would run for six to eight weeks, the weather could cause delays in the project.

Pakin said the Army Corps feels the project has been successful in preventing flooding events.

Pakin is also the project manager for a renourishment project that includes the Lower Cape Meadows area

and Cape May Point. Pakin said the Point beaches where beach saver reefs were installed have seen much lower erosion than they anticipated.

"The Corps did the initial construction fill in 2004, and the (beaches) with the reefs held remarkably well," he

Pakin said the Army Corps is hoping to award a contract to do beach fill in the meadows and as part of the contract would remove some of the sand from beaches that were closed because the water's edge is too close to where the beach savers were located. The sand removed from Point beaches would be relocated to the meadows area.

Pakin said Meadows/Point project is separate from the project located at the Coast Guard
